IT is positively afferted, that France has officially notified her Intention of supporting the Patriotic Party of Holland at every Hazard. It is imagined the Prussian Army is already arrived there; and if the Court of France does not return a fatisfactory Answer to his Prussian Majethy's Memorial, the Orders from the King of Prassia are, that his Army do immediately march forward to the Support of the Stadtholder.
