

[Brought down from LONDON by EXPRESS.]

LONDON, AUGUST 19.

THE Arrival of the EARL of ABERGVEENY was announced at the India House Yesterday Morning. She sailed from China the 31st of March, in Company with the Lord Thurlow, Henry Dundas, Ceres, Walfingham, Talbot, Belvidra, Woodcut, and

Five Botany Bay Ships, viz. The Scarborough, Lady Juliana, Neptune, Junifer, and Sparrow. The Earl of Abergveenny arrived at St. Helena the 30th of June; found there the Worcester from Bombay. She spoke the Carnatic for Cochin and CHINA, the 17th of May, all well; and failed from St. Helena the 4th of July.

The Lord Thurlow arrived at St. Helena the 1st of July, to be followed with the Worcester the 6th or 7th. The Ceres arrived at St. Helena the 4th of July.

By Letters from on board the WORCESTER we learn, that on her Passage from Bombay, she touched at Amango, on the Coast of Malabar, on the 29th of March.

That General ABERCROMBIE had successfully effected his March on the Ghauts, and was within fifty Miles of SERINGAPATAM, the Capital of the Tyrant. Colonel HARTLEY had marched still nearer, and was ravaging the Country.

EARL CORNWALLIS, by some brilliant Manœuvres, had deceived the Enemy, attacked the Ghauts without sustaining any Loss, and was close to BANGALORE. General ABERCROMBIE at the Moment it was taken—and the Capture was supposed to be inevitable—intended to form a Junction with the Earl, a Measure which would be productive of the happiest Consequences, since by that Means the Inconveniences of weakening the Army by Detachments to Madras for Stores, to conduct the Siege of Seringapatam, would be avoided.

THE PESHWA with large Reinforcements had joined the Mahatta Forces, and a Detachment of 6000 Cavalry was sent to the Assistance of Earl CORNWALLIS.

The important Fort of DARWAR had at length surrendered to the combined Forces of the English and Mahattas, so that there is not now any Prospect of Strength between DARWAR and SERINGAPATAM, near which the Cavalry of the latter had been penetrated.

TIFPO in Despair had abandoned BANGALORE to its Fate, and trembling for the Fate of his Capital, had not scrupled to make the most humiliating Overtures to Earl CORNWALLIS; which were, however, rejected with the Contempt they merited.

The LORD HAWKSBURY outward bound arrived at CHINA the 21st of June.

THE LEOPARD and THAMES Men of War arrived at China the latter End of March, conveyed the China Fleet through the Straits, and then proceeded to Bencoolon, from whence the POLUIS was to be dispatched for England in April with a valuable Cargo of Pepper.

The Passengers expected in the WORCESTER are, Captain and Mrs. Bond; Captains Kennon, and Valentine; Lieutenants Walten, Frazer, Longdale, Hayes, Browning, Maxwell, and Sheldon; Cornet Ridout, and Messrs. Williams, Faulkner, Grant, and Chambers.

Captain JOHN TAYLOR, late Commissary of Stores on the Coast, came Passenger in the Worcester as far as St. Helena, when he quitted her and embarked on board the Lord Thurlow for England.

Lord Hood is to succeed Admiral Roddam, as Port Admiral at Portsmouth, as soon as his present Term is expired. Admiral Goodall is to be sent to the Mediterranean, and Sir Richard King will go out next Season to Newfoundland.

The Ships that are to be commissioned as Guardships are to carry their full Complement of Men.

All the Supermariners of the Fleet are ordered to be discharged.

Mr. Brooks, the King's Messinger, who has been some Time at Petersburg, is dispatched from that Place to Sitovia, and from thence to Constantinople. The last Journey is a Service of some Danger, as two Couriers, the one a Russian, the other a Turk, have lately been flout in performing that Journey.

The Meeting of Parliament, it is expected, will be put off till after Christmas. The settled Aspect of Affairs in this Country, may be thought not to render their Meeting at an earlier Period necessary.

THE FUNDS we believe were never so high as they are at present, except at one Period. In December, 1774, the Three per Cents. were done for about a Week or so.

When Lord NORTH established a Four per Cent. Fund, in 1777, he made a Proviso in the Act, that the Publick should have the Option of redeeming the Stock at Par, any Time after the Expiration of ten Years. That Term being expired, the Four per Cents. are now redeemable.

Extracts of a Letter from an English Gentleman resident in Lisle, dated the 13th of August, 1791.

"The State of this Country, is, I assure you, in the greatest Ferment possible; no Law, no Order, no Discipline; in fact every one is devising Means to save himself. The present new Government cannot possibly stand, unless some very unforeseen Event should take Place. All the Nobility and monied People have left the State, and are making Head against it, joined by every farouging Power; and on the Frontiers Strictures are already commenced. The National Assembly file Strength daily, both by Diffusions of their Officers and Privates, added to great internal Divisions. The other Party increases hourly. Necessary Letters are just received threatening to blow this Town up before the Thirtieth of the present Month; and Prince Condé has written to the National Assembly, rejecting all the Offers which have been made to him; and concludes with saying, that he will raise his Birth Right with the Sword in one Hand and a Pistol in the other. He is now encamped on the Frontiers with Thirty Thousand Men, favoured by the neighbouring Powers, who have also from Two to Three Hundred Thousand Men on the Frontiers ready for a Descent, which is hourly expected. What will be the Event God only knows; but such at this Moment is the State of this unhappy Country."

Wednesday died at Wanstead in Essex, Mrs. Thurlow, Widow of the late Bishop of Durham, and Sister-in-Law to the Lord Chancellor.

COUNTRY NEWS.

Worcester, August 17. On Thursday last, the Mayor and Corporation of this City dined with Lord Coventry, at his Seat at Croome, and were entertained with a Politeness and Hospitality peculiar to his Lordship.

The Anniversary Meeting of the Subscribers and Friends to our Infirmary, was held on Friday last at the Hop-Pole Inn. In the Course of the Service at the Cathedral, a Te Deum and Jubilate, composed by Mr. Pitt, and Dr. Boyce's celebrated Anthem, "Blessed is he that condescendeth the Poor," were performed by the Gentlemen of the Choir, in a Manner that did them great Credit; after which an excellent Sermon was preached by the Reverend Mr. Kilvert, from these Words, "Stretch forth thine Hand unto the Poor, that thy Blessing may be perfected." The Collection for the Church Door amounted to £51. 16s. 10d. Ten Pounds of which was given by the Corporation of this City.

The Hopes of many Hop Planters in this County and Herefordshire, are much elevated by the sudden and unexpected Change in their respective Plantations, occasioned by the late happy Rains, and a Succession of warm Weather.

At our Fair, on Monday last, there was a great Show of Cattle, which were lower in Price than usual; lean Cattle very low.—A fine Shew of Loxs, and good ones brought high Prices.—Higs were dearer than they have been for some Time past.

Monday Afternoon, about Five o'Clock, we had a violent Storm of Thunder and Lightning, accompanied with some Showers of Rain. During the Storm there was one of the loudest Peals of Thunder ever remembered, which was the more awful, as it fell so hurt very near the Earth. The Storm was succeeded by a heavy and almost incessant Rain, till nine at Night. We do not hear of any Damage, except to a small summer House in a Garden at the Butts, which had some Glass shattered, and a large Aperture made through the Roof.

On Friday next, Robert Cook, one of the Birmingham Rioters, and Richard Paraway, for a Burglary, are to be executed, according to their sentence, at Red-hill, near this City.

At the Landowne Fair on Wednesday last, there was a large Quantity of Cheese on the Down, which, notwithstanding its high Price, was soon sold. New Cheese went on the Average 36s. to 42s. Old 55s. to 56s. There was a vast Shew of Horses and Beasts, which sold reasonable. The Concourse of People was immense.

On Friday last Mr. Wearworth, Brewer, was elected Mayor of Marlborough for the Year ensuing.

The intense Heat of Monday last was succeeded in the Afternoon by a heavy Fall of Rain, with Thunder, and a long and rapid succession of the most violent Flashes of Lightning that has been remembered for many Years. It began about Four in the Afternoon, and did not cease till Four in the Morning. It was not confined to any Point, but the Flashes meeting illuminated at Times the whole Horizon.

Birmingham, August 18. On Saturday next the Attizes for this County begin at Warwick, before Baron Perry and Mr. Baron Hoibam, at which the following Prisoners are to take their Trials:

William Shaker, Joseph Carlew, John Clifton, Bartholomew Fisher, John Green, Daniel Rose, W. Hands, alias Hammonds, James Watkins, Robert Whitehead, John Stokes, and Frances Field, alias Rodney, charged with being concerned in the late Riots in this Place.

It is not a little remarkable, that one of the Transports in the Oxford Fleet, now on Duty here, has been 46 Years in that Corps, and the Black Dragoon's Horse more than 24 Years in the same Regiment.

On Thursday last died, Mr. J. N. Lane, Grocer, of Bull-Street, in this Town. The late Riots had such a dreadful Effect upon him, that he was deprived of his Senses, and he continued in a State of Delirium till Death released him from the Violence of his Sufferings.

On Saturday died, much lamented, Mr. Thomas Ashwin, of this Town, Jananary, who has left an amiable Wife and nine young Children to deplore his untimely Loss.—In his Endeavours, with several others, to represent the Fury of the infuriated Populace at Mr. Ryland's House, on the 15th ult. Mr. Ashwin unfortunately received a violent Blow on his Head with a brick, from which Time he languished, notwithstanding every Advice and Assistance from the Faculty.—The Wretch who flung the Brick fell a Sacrifice to his misguided Zeal, and perished in the Conflagration of Mr. Ryland's elegant House.

OXFORD, August 20.

On the 6th Instant, the Rev. Dr. Ford, Principal of Magdalen Hall, was collated by the Lord Bishop of Hereford, to the Prebend of Hinton, in that Cathedral, vacant by the Death of Dr. Wanley.

And on Saturday last the Rev. Dr. Holmes, Poetry Professor in this University, was collated by his Lordship to the united Prebends of Moreton and Whaddon, in the Cathedral of Hereford, vacant by the Resignation of Doctor Ford.

On Saturday last died, at Frogmoll, on his Return from London, Mr. Paul Ashmore, of Winchcombe, in Gloucestershire, deformedly etched by his Family and Friends.
