DEPRESSION OF THE FUNDS.

THE FUNDS have felt a very uncommon depression since the last news was received from the NETHERLANDS. The accounts from thence have led people to imagine that the war must finally reach Great Britain, though nothing can be more erroneous than this opinion.

There is another report, which has occasioned some alarm, originating in an order sent by Government to Portsmouth, for the immediate sailing of the Niger frigate. On Wednesday morning at two o'clock, an express arrived from the Admiralty, at Sir Andrew Snape Hammond's, Portsmouth. Immediately the Marine Corps

This sudden preparation, and the secrecy that was observed, of course occasioned many conjectures. It is therefore of public consequence that we should explain the matter. It is extremely easy to create an alarm, and it is equally easy to remove it, when the causes that gave rise to it are explained.

In consequence of very serious tumults which have for some days past subsided among the seamen at Shildt for an advance of wages, a matter by no means unusual in the Coal Trade, Government has wisely thought fit to send a Corps of Marines thither, to quell the disturbances and restore order. It is for this purpose that the Niger has sailed from Portsmouth, and we have no doubt but that in a few days we shall hear of perfect tranquillity in that place.

We again report, that there is no new cause of alarm.

LONDON, NOVEMBER 16.

Yesterday, soon after two o'clock, Lord Kenyon took the woolpack, as Speaker of the House of Peers, and, being attended by the Earl of Chesham and Lord Walsingham, as Lords in Communion, with the usual ceremony, proceeed both Houses of Parliament till the 3d of January next.

This day, at noon, the King will come from Windsor Lodge to St. James's, where his Majesty will hold a levee. After the Levee, his Majesty will hold a Privy Council for appointing Sheriffs for the different counties.

Yesterday, funerals were issued from the Council Office, Whitehall, and sent off by special messengers, to those Members of the Cabinet Council now residing in the country, desiring their attendance in town immediately, on official business.

A Correspondent writes, "The Printer may be assured of the authenticity of the following information: A few days ago a Messenger was dispatched from this City to Paris, with a proposal to acknowledge the French Republic Government, and also to propose a cessation of hostilities, with the mediation of this country to bring about a general tranquility. An answer is daily expected, and there is every reason to believe the proposal will meet a favourable reception, and the effusion of human blood be put a stop to."

Yesterday dispatches were received at the Secretary of State's Office, from the Governor of Jamaica. They were brought over in the Mars, Capt. Langford, arrived in the Downs; and contain an account of the arrival of several ships from London, Bristol, Liverpool, &c. that the ships for Europe were all failed, except about five, which were then landing, and were appointed to fail the latter end of this month; and that they were plentifully supplied with provisions, and that every thing was quiet.

The Mercury, Capt. Day, and the Eliza, Capt. Middleton, from the South Seas, arrived safe in the Downs; they bring a very favourable account of that place, the arrival of a great number of ships, and that trade was in a very flourishing state.

The transfer books of East India Stock, shut on the 4th of next month, and open again on the 17th of January; and the dividend warrants will be delivered on the 14th of the same month.

On Tuesday last a very numerous Meeting was held at Whitehall Bridges, for the purpose of considering the propriety of applying to Parliament to obtain an Act to extend the present navigation from Burton, to Fradley Heath, to unite with the Coventry Canal. The utility of the measure was set forth, and a subscription opened for carrying the plan into effect. The estimate for completing the same was twenty-three thousand one hundred and thirty-six pounds eighteen shillings and two pence; but it was proposed to raise twenty-five thousand pounds, by a subscription not exceeding five shares of 1000. to each subscriber; and from the number present, it was resolved that no person should have more than two shares, when the sum of One Hundred and Five Thousand Pounds and upwards, was subscribed on Monday.

Wednesday died, in the 78th year of his age, Samuel Cam, Esq. of Bradford, one of his Majesty's Justices of the Peace for Wilts.

A crested of forty-nine houses is to be built at Weymouth, above the Duke of Gloucester's lodge; the plan was shewn to his Majesty, and approved of.

On Wednesday an express arrived with the account of the first day's drawing of the Irish Lottery, when No. 1089 appeared the first drawn, and as such entitled to 1000l. The following numbers are drawn prizes above 25l. No. 31,874, 32,126, 39,225, 50l. each.

Second day, the following numbers were drawn prizes above 25l. No. 12,828, 34,577, prizes of 500l. No. 6128, 9141, 32,060, 32,734, prizes of 500l. each.

KING'S BENCH, NOVEMBER 14. CRIM. CON. LEVERING AGAINST EDWARDS.

Mr. Mingo, on the part of the defendant in this cause, filed, he was instructed by his client to move for a new trial. He observed, that whatever might be thought of the verdict and the large damages, (the sum of 500l.) under all the circumstances, there was evidence, on the part of the defendant, that might well be considered by another Jury, if his Lordship thought such a case a fit subject for a new trial. It was an action for criminal conversation between the defendant and the plaintiff's wife, and tried before his Lordship on Monday last.

Lord Kenyon said that there was a wife in print, and he had been in manuscript, determined by Lord Mansfield. An application had been made to the Court for a new trial, on the ground of excessive damages; Lord Mansfield said "he could not set a price upon adultery," and therefore a new trial was refused; so it seemed in this case. Indeed, he thought, that granting a rule to show cause why there should not be a new trial, would only be adding expense to expense. Upon the evidence he had no doubt but the verdict was right. Whether he should have given the same damages, he should say nothing; he had no business to ask himself that question.

Mr. Justice Buller is confined to his house by a fit of the gout.

Worcester, November 14. On Saturday night died, Mr. Alderman Wilkins, of this city, who served the office of Mayor in the year 1782; a true friend to our happy Constitution. The several offices to which he was called by his fellow-citizens, he discharged with fidelity and honour; and in private life, was an affectionate husband and relation; a good friend and neighbour; and effectually disposed to relieve the distresses of others.

OXFORD, NOVEMBER 17.

On Saturday last died, in the Seventy-eighth Year of her Age, Mrs. Elizabeth Beale, Widow of the late Mr. Beale, of St. Clement's, in the Suburbs of this City.

Thursday Se'night died, of a rapid Decline, at the Reverend W. Miller's, High Wycombe, Mrs. Watkins, Relict of the late Mr. Watkins, of Britton.

On Friday the 8th Instant, Richard Read, of Thame, was brought by Warrant before Richard Paul Jodrell, Esq. one of the Justices for this County, charged with violently assaulting and endangering the Person of Frances Pocock, Servant to Mr. May of Thame, on the Evening of the 5th of November, by firing Crackers and other combustible Materials in the public Streets in a wanton and malicious Manner; by which the Gown of the said Frances Pocock was burnt in four Places, and her Cap singed. We are informed, that the said Richard Read in consequence of his tender Years, being only Fifteen, and in consequence of the Statute of William III. requiring two Witnesses to prove the Fact, and Frances Pocock alone appearing, was dismissed by a Reprimand and escaped further Prosecution; but it is hoped this may prove a Caution to others, and in future prevent such publick Noisances in great Towns from the dangerous and illegal Use of Serpents, Crackers, and other Fire Works.

On Tuesday last Thomas Nash, a Journeyman Papermaker, late of Backland near Dover in Kent, and formerly of High Wycombe, Bucks, was apprehended by Mr. John Smith of this Place, by Virtue of a Warrant from one of the Judges of his Majesty's Court of King's Bench, the said Thomas Nash having joined in a Conspiracy with ten others, demanding higher Wages than are usual in that Trade, and for which Offence a Bill of Indemnity was preferred and found a True Bill, at the late Quarter Sessions at Canterbury; to which Bill the said Nash has not pleaded but fled from Justice. Strict Search is also making throughout the Kingdom after such other of the Conspirators as are not yet apprehended.—Nash stands committed to our City Gaol till a Habeas is obtained for his Removal to Canterbury.

But no such People as Wm. and G. Anderson are known at No. 29, Bainhill Street; nor is Willis and Rose at Bradford; neither is Alexander King to be heard of in Great Surrey Street, Black Friars.
