HOUSE OF COMMONS, MARCH 28.

READ the Bills on the table, and received others from the Commons. The Commissioners of Crown Lands brought up their final report.—Ordered to be printed.

The Lord Chancellor and Privy Seal being seated, a message was sent to the Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Clerk of the Black Rod, desiring their attendance to hear the Commission read. The Speaker and several Members appearing below the Bar, the Lord Chancellor informed them that His Majesty did not think fit to appear, and had empowered certain Peers, named in the commission, to set their names to the Bills that had passed.

The House adjourned till Monday week, and the House of Commons to Thursday next.

HOUSE OF COMMONS, March 28. Sir F. Molyneux informed the House, that their Lordships desired their attendance. The Speaker, on his return, said that he had been to certain public and private bills; amongst the public bills were the Indemnity Qualification bill, the American Intercourse bill, the bill to amend the Act for the better regulation of the Bank Transfer Forgery bill, the Royal Exchange Assurance bill; and amongst the private bills Mr. Stewart's Divorce bill.

Mr. Dundas gave notice, that he should bring forward his propositions on the government and commerce of India on Monday next. Mr. Grey gave notice, that he should move for a reform in the parliamentary representation on Monday May 6.

LONDON, MARCH 29. A variety of rumours were in circulation yesterday, respecting a report of a Revolution in Paris. A number of letters were said to have been received in Town, confirming that report—and considering the present circumstances of the French, it was not totally improbable.

Captain York, of the Circe frigate, is supposed to have made the most successful cruise of any officer yet against the French. His captures are already estimated at 20,000l.

The number of houses at Meirichtr damaged by the late bombardment are 841, without including the churches and cloisters.

It is said that three battalions of French emigrants are to be raised in England, and transported to the coast of Brittany, where they are to be landed, and where they expect to be joined by 50,000 men, to raise a royal standard, and restore the monarchy of France.

The laudable resolutions entered into by the merchants, gentlemen, and traders of the cities of Bath and Bristol, for supporting the existing banks in those places, by accepting in payment, as usual, the notes issued by the several banking companies, seem already to have had a happy effect in restoring mutual confidence, so essential to the support of public credit.

The gentlemen, tradesmen, and others, of the cities of Hereford, Worcester, and the towns of Bewdley, Kidderminster, Stourbridge, Lominster, Upton, Tewkesbury, and divers other places, have adopted similar resolutions; which have been productive of like salutary effects.

Notwithstanding contrary reports, we have good authority to say that the Bank of England continues, if not exactly, its usual liberality to the banking and mercantile houses of London, where appearances become more favourable to a speedy restoration of credit and confidence.

Yesterday a General Court was held at the India-Office, when the business of the Renewal of the Charter was further discussed.—There were a number of Speakers; but as the business will come on again, we think it unnecessary to enter into any detail of the debate.

On Monday last, agreeable to the High Sheriff's notice, a great number of the freeholders of that county assembled at Warwick to nominate a candidate in the room of Sir Robert Lawley, Bart. deceased.

Mr. Addley and Mr. Digby were severally nominated by their respective friends; but as Sir John Mordaunt had withdrawn his refusal, and was now brought forward, both the former gentlemen declined; and no other gentleman having yet declared himself a candidate, there seems little probability of a contest.

The Rev. Mr. Profler is appointed Lecturer of Monmouth Church, in the room of Mr. Smith deceased; in consequence of which, he returns the Matricship of the Free Grammar-school in that town. As an instance of the present ability of the British manufacturers in the management of cotton, we are told, that one pound of article can be spun in such a manner, as ultimately to be worth thirty guineas.
