A variety of rumours were in circulation yesterday, re-

fpecting a report of a Revolution in Paris.

A number of letters were faid to have been received in Town, confirming that report—and confidering the prefent circumstances of the French, it was not totally improbable.

And we have the satisfaction of communicating to our

Readers from refpectable authority, that a third action had taken place between the Allied and French Armies, in which the former had complete fuccess; this was yesterday confirmed through a variety of channels.

The particulars of this third action were communicated

by the Prince of Saxe-Cobourg himfelf, in a letter to Prince Frederic of Brunfwick in Holland. At the time our advice came from thence, it was not known there that the French had evacuated Bruffels. This event, however, took place on Saturday last; and on Sunday morning the Auftrians entered the City, and took poffession.

We are indebted for the above fact to an express which

reached this metropolis yesterday afternoon from Ostend, and which left that place fo late as the 26th, (Tuefday.) It brought the additional particulars that Dumourier was retreating with the utmost precipitation by Ghent and Courtray, whilst the Imperialists unremittingly pressed on his rear, and harraffed his discomfitted, panic-thruck battalions. It appears, that on the 22d (Friday) Dumourier at-

tempted another fland, the laft effort, but an unfuccessful one, to fecure for his desperate bands of followers, and for the plunder they had amassed there in the name of the French Legislators, a safe retreat from the Belgic Provinces. This fland gave rife to the conclusive action, fo decifive in its event, and in which the flaughter of the French is faid to have been confiderable. - True Briton.
