Menia, Ang. 19. We marched from Tourcoing to Mesia yellerday morning. The Dutch had attacked and carried the polis of Lincelles and Blaton; but in the evening the French returned in great force, and attacked them again. The Dutch fent to His Royal Highnefs the Duke of York for fupport at Lincelles. The three Battalions in diantiy marched, without much profpect, however, of being engaged; but on coming up, they found the Dutch overpowered by numbers, and in danger of loding their cannon. This circumdiance gave the British Guards an opportunity of performing one of the most brilliant actions that this or any other War ever furnished an instance of. They vigorculfy attacked and carried the Village, under a very heavy fire of both grape and musquet thot; and trafailty, with unexampled raphility, proceeded to attack the Works which the French occupied, and in and near which were drawn up about 2000 Frenchmen, according to the most moderate reports. They drove the French from the Redoubts with fixed buyenets, killed between three and four hundred—took 11 pieces of cannon, with easilous, horses, &c. a great number of pissoners, and one shandard. All this was performed with little more than 1000 men with only their Battalion guns; a braver aftion never perhaps was performed; and it reflects the highest honour upon the officers and men engaged, as well as upon the country that is fortnance enough to claim them.

In this spirited action, two officers and thirty-five men wounded.
