TUESDAY'S POST.

VIENNA, April 24, 1795.
WHILST every thing seems to tend towards a general Peace with France, a heavy storm seems to be gathering in the North of Europe. The Empress of Russia is said to have declared void the act of guarantee concerning the Prussian dominions at Silesia, and to have also made a solemn declaration, that henceforth there should no longer exist either a King or a Republic of Poland. The Prussian Minister, M. Luchefini, makes preparations for his departure from this metropolis. Our army has lately lost three of its most respected Generals, Baron Smitzfeld, Governor of Mantua; Baron Elmpt, Governor of Prague; and Count d'Arvo, Governor of Olmutz. Through the disorganization of the Polish troops, our army has received 10,000 recruits, who have enlisted in the Imperial service.

HOUSE OF PEERS, Monday, May 11, 1795.
Finished the hearing of Counsel on the appeal, the Creditors of the York Building Company versus MacKenzie.—Adjudged judgment till a future day.
Several Bills were received from the Commons.

HOUSE OF COMMONS, Monday, May 11, 1795.
The Chancellor of the Exchequer stated, that understanding that the Speaker was extremely indisposed, he should propose that the House adjourn till Wednesday, and that the consideration of his Majesty's Message relative to a provision for his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales be postponed till that day.

Mr. Jekyll expressed the regret which he, in common with every Member of the House, felt on account of the occasion which rendered their adjournment necessary. [This sentiment was received with a general burst of feeling from every quarter of the House.] This being the case, he should propose to postpone his motion respecting the recall of Earl Fitzwilliam, which stood for to-morrow, till Tuesday evening; but as the Right Honourable Gentleman (Mr. Dundas) had given notice of his intention to bring forward the India Budget on that day, he hoped he would now defer it till Thursday.

Mr. Jekyll afterwards got up, and said, that in the present state of the Speaker's indisposition, he considered Wednesday as too early a day, and should therefore propose that the House adjourn till Thursday. [A cry of Thursday, Thursday, from all parts of the House.] The Speaker said, he felt himself extremely obliged by the degree of anxiety and interest respecting his indisposition, which was expressed from all sides of the House. Indisposed as he was, he had hoped that he should have been able to go through his duty to day; but finding that impossible, he trusted he should be well enough to attend in his place on Thursday.

The House then adjourned to Thursday, the following being understood to be the arrangement of public business: the consideration of his Majesty's message respecting a provision for the Prince of Wales on Thursday next; Mr. Jekyll's motion respecting the recall of Earl Fitzwilliam on Thursday evening; and Mr. Dundas's India Budget on the Thursday following.

LONDON, MAY 12.
The last accounts from Madrid intimate, that the Spanish Court continues its warlike operations with unremitting assiduity. The Marquis of Rubi has been appointed Captain-General of Andalusia, and the Prince of Castel Franco Commander of the army of Navarre.

Letters, it is said, of the most conciliating nature, have lately been passing between the King of Prussia, and our Commander in Chief upon the Continent; this correspondence clofed with one of the most imperious messages for our troops to leave their present position, ever sent from one Power to the servant of another.

Sir Frederick Eden arrived in town on Saturday from France. The Committees of Government at Paris refuse to make an exchange of Seamen prisoners.—We wonder how the friends of the French Democrats on this side the water will reconcile this to the principles of moderation and conciliation towards England, which they are so industrious to inculcate as the motives of the Conventionists. It is hoped that England will now exert every nerve, and that Britons will be indissolubly united, to crush and chastise wretches who, in all situations, show themselves the disgrace of human nature.

The Report of Sir F. Eden having been at Paris, is without foundation.—he has been only at Brest and Dieppe; at the last of which places he was met by a Commissioner from the Convention.

We have been informed on high authority, that Government, with a generosity peculiarly characteristic of Englishmen, have determined to dismiss two or three hundred French prisoners on their parole; trusting to the remnant of honour yet left in the French Nation, to send as many of our seamen back in return. We admire the motive; but we much doubt the success, among a people lost to every sense of shame and virtue.

We have been at every pains to ascertain the real cause of Lord Hood's quitting his command so abruptly, a circumstance that occasions no small speculation.—His Lordship, it seems, thought the force he was carrying out with him too small, and he wrote a letter to the Admiralty to say that he could not leave England without leaving a public testimony of his opinion behind him. Upon receipt of this letter Lord Spencer immediately wrote to him to resign his command. This spirited conduct of the First Lord of the Admiralty we cannot but think justifiable in every point of view.

On Thursday her Royal Highness the Duchess of York entered the twenty-ninth year of her age.

Tuesday morning, at a quarter past ten o'clock, the very important debate on the Bill for the admission of his Majesty's Roman Catholic Subjects to the privilege of Seats in Parliament, and to the Executive Offices of the State, concluded in the House of Commons of Ireland. The debate commenced on Monday evening before five o'clock. Thirty-five Members spoke at considerable length on this occasion. At half past ten the house divided, when the numbers for rejecting the Bill were, Ayes 155; Noes 84. Majority for rejecting the Bill 71.

On Saturday morning at eight, 2345 of the Guards landed at Greenwich, and proceeded immediately for London. The Band belonging to the Coldstream regiment went to meet them. They were marched in three divisions, each headed by their Colonels, viz. Caulfield, Ludlow, and Sir C. Agill.—The Colours of each division were preferred; the second and third were thro' through, rent in several places, and so much soiled, that in two of them the armorial bearings were scarcely to be seen.

Likewise his Majesty, besides receiving the Soldiers of the Guards as they landed in the most gracious and paternal manner, conversing and shaking hands with many of them, gave to each man half a crown. His Majesty seemed at times much affected, and the tears were observed to trickle down his cheeks; a proof of the amiable and benign feelings that are the inmates of his bosom.

The Duke of York's stud on the Continent comprised eighty-five horses; the whole of which were on Monday landed at Yarmouth.

A Dutch vessel, with a flag of truce, arrived at Harwich on Thursday, having on board about 60 women and children, being the different families of the unfortunate 57th regiment, that was made prisoners at Bergen-op-Zoom. They were first sent to Lifle, and from thence back to Amsterdum, where they were ordered to take them to England. They speak well of the humanity of the French, from whom they received many favours; the Dutch took from them what the French had given!

On Friday the Common Council of the City of London appointed a Committee, consisting of the Lord Mayor, all the Aldermen, and one Commoner of each Ward, to consider of the best means of reducing the high price of provisions.

A Motion was made, that the Corporation should discontinue all public dinners for one year; and an Amendment was moved by Mr. Deputy Birch, that the money so saved should be applied to the relief of the Poor. But upon the Motion thus amended, the previous Question was moved and carried by 39 against 26.

Captain Molloy continued the examination of his witnesses on Saturday and Monday. Major Driffield, of the Marines, and Mr. Luckey, the Master of the Caesar, gave a very ample and decided testimony in the Captain's favour; the former, in particular, declaring, that as he had a foul to be saved, he thought that Captain Molloy's conduct worthy a brave man, zealous to serve his King and Country. The latter entered into a very minute detail of the operations on board the Caesar; which he thought took a proper position, and used every possible exertion on the first of June.

The unfortunate King of Poland, exciting the humanity and generosity of the Empress of Russia, is to have the Dukedom of Courland. The present Duke is to retire on a pension.

We contradicted a report of the Brunwick's having been on fire at Spitehead. The report must have originated from a man's having been punished for his remissness in not having properly attended to the lights entrusted to his care.

The Duke of Northumberland has not only left off Hair Powder himself, but given each of his servants Two Guineas a year additional Wages, on condition that they shall go unpowdered.—What proper motive his Grace can have for this conduct, we confess ourselves at a loss to determine.

The Town of Bremen is remarkable for the beauty of its Women, and not less for their penchant to a scarlet coat; for the three days previous to the Brigade of Guards marching from thence, nothing else was talked of, and carried into execution, but marriages between our Soldiers and the fair and loving foreigners of Bremen—the 1st Regiment of Guards took away sixteen pretty girls—the second twelve, and the third eighteen; total, forty-six beautiful adventurers.

General Lindlay, of whose death we fear there is no doubt, is supposed to have fallen a sacrifice to the climate, in consequence of the fatigue to which he was exposed by his anxious zeal for the service. The loss of an Officer who was so sincerely attached to his profession, is at all times a loss to the Public; but we fear it will be particularly felt at the present moment, when there is no Officer in the West Indies between General Vaughan, the Commander in Chief, and a Lieutenant-Colonel.
