THE French Papers to the agth inft. arrived this morning at one o'clock. These Journals, received by express, afforded no intelligence whatever respecting the Negociation at Liste. The dispatches received yesterday, whatever be their complexion, came directly from the feat of Diplomatic discussion. Their contents were probably known by our Ministers as soon as the French Directory.

A letter from Mactrid, interted in the Redaction, fays, that the English had began the bombardment of Cadiz. This is slated to have commenced on the 14th of July; fixteen bombs only were discharged, and little damage ensued. There was an action between the English and Spanish gun-boats, in which the latter stiffered feverely. The Spanish Admiral is desirous of coming out and giving battle to the English. The Admiral Lord St. Vincent's is faid in the French Papers to have required ter millions of signess as the price of his abstaining from the bombardment of Cadiz.

The Paris Papers fay that General Hoche has resulted his appointment as Minister at War. His plea is, that he is not of the age required by the Constitution.
