SATURDAY'S POST

[BY EXPRESS.] LONDON, AUGUST 4.

LAST night the Hamburg Mail which were due arrived, by which we learn, that the Emperor has refused to acknowledge the Venetian Ambassador; and in case of his continuing any correspondence with the Government, he has ordered him to quit Vienna in 24 hours. On the side of Austria every thing bears the face of hostilities, especially on the Rhine. The Austrians are estimated at 100,000 in the environs of Wurtzbourg. The Archduke Charles's head quarters are to be removed to the city of Vienna. The King of Prussia has quitted his capital with a utmost privacy on the 5th ult. for Carlsruhe. It was generally understood that a meeting with the Emperor Paul was intended, who was upon the eve of going on board his fleet.

The news by the above Mail has been in a great measure anticipated by the regular letters from the Paris Gazette; but a private letter from Hamburg, contains news from Holland respecting the Negotiations at Lifle. It confirms the reports that the Negotiations are encumbered with many difficulties; and that they principally regard the West India, which the Anglo-Dutch would be a bone of contention. The French having guaranteed the restitution of the Settlements to the Batavian Republic.

The three Spanish Prelates who went to Rome have obtained the abolition of the Inquisition in Spain. The report was not generally credited. The *Coronaca*, of 74 guns, is to join the Dutch fleet upon the coast of the Texel. On the 19th the whole expedition only waited for an East wind. M. Noel, the French Ambassador, and the Swedish Envoy have taken a view of the fleet, which consists of 100 vessels, besides the ships of war. The greatest unanimity is said to prevail among all the officers, who are to be commanded by General Howe, as soon as the Squadron can fall from Dunkirk.

We are extremely sorry to confirm the capture of the *Dolphin* Packet, one of the best in the service, after a brave resistance of four hours. The Packet being becalmed, the Dutch rogues, by which she was taken, were ordered to be carried very heavy metal. She was twice beaten off, and nearly sunk; but after repairing her damages, she attacked the *Dolphin* a third time, and took her. Captain Flynn was the only person on board wounded, which was in the arm and hand; and Mr. Berwick on board; and the report of the capture of one of the crew who arrived yesterday at Lord Grenville's office, having made his escape, the passengers are all sent prisoners to Dunkirk.

The Tax on Clocks and Watches takes place on all *keys and wares*, or *silver*, after the 1st of this month. It appears that Family Watches, and not worn or used for any other purpose, are liable to the duty. But no watch may be liable to which is not acted, according to the directions of the act, in lifts to be left at every person's house or apartment, by the Affidavits of the Tax. Persons living in houses exempted from the duties on watches, are not liable to pay, if they have only one Clock and one Silver or Metal Watch. And occupiers of houses not rateable to more than ten windows, are exempted from duty, in respect of Wooden or other Clocks not exceeding the value of 10s. Servants in husbandry, non-committed officers and private soldiers, marines, or militia, and seamen in the navy or merchant's service are also exempted. We believe it is almost unnecessary to repeat to our readers, that the Tax is 10s. for a Gold Watch, 5s. for a Clock, and 5s. 6d. for a Silver or Metal Watch. The watch-makers are busily employed in changing their cafes for metal, and the repairer are persons to avoid Taxes than to pay them.

With the unanimous thanks of the Inhabitants of this City and Neighbourhood, I beg your acceptance of my sincerest wishes, that under these Emblems of Loyalty, your public spirit may meet with its best recompense in the preservation of the public tranquility, of which, in return to your honour, you have found forth the voluntary guard of this City.

The Captain then addressed the Cornet thus, CORNET JAYNES, To your charge I confirm this Standard, which I know, you feel the most determined resolution to preserve, under every circumstance of difficulty and danger. I think it superfluous to remind you of the importance of this trust; but I cannot refrain from expressing my confidence in your attachment to this Standard with peculiar satisfaction, while you reflect on the hands by which it was presented to us. Similar sentiments, I am assured, are deeply impressed on the minds of all our officers; and with the united force of the corps which they are with a high feeling of the cause which they are armed to defend—the safety of the Kingdom, their Property, their Religion, and Laws. The Chaplain then consecrated the Colours.

After which the Troop went through the various evolutions with its usual exactness, particularly the word exercise on horseback and in full gallop. A music was performed, and given by the Gentleman of Gloucester, the King's Head, where the day ended with the utmost harmony, conviviality, and loyalty.

OXFORD, August 3.

The Rev. George Wallcut, of Cheltenham, has been inducted, by the Bishop of Gloucester, to the Rectory of Huntley, in that county, vacant by the death of the Rev. John Morley, late Rector of Bliflton and Huntley.

Friday evening, the 27th, James's church, Bristol, was the scene of a grand and splendid Feast given by the Rev. Isaac Monkhouse, B. D. late Fellow of Queen's College, and Rector of Holwell, Southwiche, to Miss Coleman, sister of B. F. Coleman, Esq; of King-square, Bristol.

Yesterday morning died, aged upwards of 50, Mr. M. Sherman, of Headington, near this city. On Monday the Commission for holding the Assizes for the County of Berks was held at Abingdon, before Lord Kenyon, and Mr. B. Perry, where Wm. Holliday and Thomas Bond, for horse stealing, were capitally convicted and received sentence of death, but are since reprieved; Thomas Grey and James Davis, for stealing a quantity of barley, the property of Richard Babbitt, Esq; and John White, for stealing goods and wearing apparel; and Thomas Bailey, for stealing flax, were sentenced to be transported for seven years; Mary Seames, for prostituting, and Mary Humphreys, for stealing wearing apparel, to be imprisoned for 6 months; and Elizabeth White, for stealing iron, from publick pannel to be kept in hard labour in the house of correction for six calendar months.

On Wednesday their Lordships arrived at this City, when our Affairs commenced, and the following prisoners were tried—John Marshall and Thomas Andrews, for horsestealing; Jacob Abbott, for burglary; John Longley, John Thomas Jones, for sheepstealing, were capitally convicted and received sentence of death—Peter Weston and John Cherry, for stealing goods, were sentenced to be transported for seven years. Richard Clements, for stealing cloths, to be principally employed, and kept to hard labour in the House of Correction, for 12 calendar months. Wm. Martin, for receiving stolen goods knowing them to have been stolen, to be imprisoned three years, Sarah Mannell, his wife, was acquitted, as was Samuel Clarke, for horsestealing. Abbott and Jones were reprieved before the Judge, and sent to the County Jail, where they are left for correction, Mr. Kenyon, Mr. James Carpenter, were not tried for the burglary at Dorchester, but are to remain till the next Assizes, it appearing by affidavit of Mr. Parfitt that he cannot get ready to prosecute these prisoners formerly.

It is a singular and curious Clause from the late Stamp Indemnity Act, for the information of such of our Readers as it may concern:— "And whereas the Commissioners of his Majesty's Stamp Duties have not been able to supply the different parts of the kingdom with sufficient quantities of vellum, parchment, and paper, and that the deficiency has been supplied by an act of the present Session of Parliament, before the period appointed for the commencement of the said duties, and several persons have necessarily used instruments without such stamps; be it further enacted, that it shall be lawful for any person or persons who shall have used, or who shall hereafter use, any such instrument, or any such stamp, or any such paper, or any such vellum, parchment, or paper, or any such additional duty is imposed, and which shall be duly stamped in the manner required by the laws in force on and immediately before the passing of the said Act, to bring or to cause to be brought, to the said Commissioners of Stamp Duties, or their Officers appointed for such purpose, to stamp the same, on pain of forfeiture of the said additional duty only, without any penalty, if all the duties and taxes thereon persons concerned in engraving, printing, or writing, any matter or thing, on such vellum, parchment, or paper, as aforesaid, or in using the same in manner aforesaid, shall be and is and are hereby indemnified, freed, and discharged, from all and sundry penalties, forfeitures incurred, or to be incurred thereon, and are the stamping the same in manner aforesaid.
