LONDON, April 4.

We understand the English troops, which for some time past have been doing duty in Sicily, are to be conveyed to the Island of Malta, and are employed in the reduction of that Island.

Colonel Graham has the chief command on this service. If Malta is taken, therefore, it will fall to the British forces, and whatever may be the future arrangement, it is a conquest made by this country, and to be retained, or disposed of, as policy may dictate.

The expedition which is now about to sail, consisting of about 500 men, is generally believed to be destined for the Mediterranean, and perhaps may be intended to garrrison Malta.

General Stewart proceeds by land to take the command. A force expected from Italy, under the command of General Moore.

Preparations for the Secret Expedition continue the different ports. The transports with the troops at Deal were to have sailed on Wednesday, but the sudden changing of the wind prevented them from putting to sea.

A report has been for some time circulating of the sailing of the Brest fleet, or of its being ready to sail. Nothing new has occurred on this subject. The fleet has long been in readiness for putting to sea, but the time of its sailing is very uncertain.

Our own fleet, off Brest, consists of about thirty-one ships of the line, a force equal to the conquest of any which can leave the French ports.

According to the last Hamburg Mails, Mr. Wilson has signed a Convention with the Elector of Saxony for 12,000 subsidary troops, for which England is to pay 200,000 of florins.

It is generally believed to be adopted. The alternative system will again be adopted in Switzerland. The different parties which exist in that country are too opposite in characters and opinions to be united in a Republic.
