SUMMARY OF POLITICS.

Advices were on Tuesday received from Portugal and Spain. So late as the 3d inst. no accounts had reached either Lisbon or Oporto of the entrance of the French into Portugal. The Marquis Romana and General Blake, having by their manesures prevented the enemy from surrounding them, intend it appears, to take a position on the frontiers of that kingdom.

The letters from Lisbon state, that the first divi-The letters from Lisbon state, that the first divi-sion of the levy-eu-masse had been embodied, amounting to 6000, but was expected in a few days to amount to 70,000. The English goods in the custom-bouse were permitted to be re-embark-ed without paying duty. A French Colonel had been taken at a hotel, and after being cut in a shocking manner by some Portuguese pikemen, was rescued from them by a guard of the 20th light dragoons, but died next day. The 14th light dragoons, which had been embarked, were again dragoons, which had been embarked, were again landed to guard against riots; the 27th foot still remained on board, and the 9th foot had embarked; the 29th foot embarked on the 31st ult Different persons, sometimes twenty or thirty in a day, were put under arrest, charged with jacobin-ism. The whole of the Danish ships, twenty-nine in number, in the Tagus, were under orders for England.

Don Pedro Cevallos, Plenipotentiary and Mi nister Extraordmary from the Supreme Junta, ar rived at Portsmouth on Monday, in the Spanish line of battle ship Algezims, formerly the British Hannibal. He was accompanied by the lady of the Spanish Ambassador, Admiral Apodaca. His Ex-cellency in consequence left town on Tuesday morning for Portsmouth. M. Cevallos, we understand, is the bearer of the Treaty of Commercial etween this country and Spain.

The principal inhabitants, or rather the Members of the Supreme Junta, are said to be divided among themselves, and the party of Morla, the avowed partisan of King Joseph, is said to have gained an ascendancy.

A number of arrests took place on the 2d in stant, and apprehensions were hourly entertained of popular commotions.

The Governor of Cadiz, Viruex, has arrived in the Algeziras, with Cevallos, besides a number of distinguished personages. The cause of their leaving Cadiz cannot be long concealed.

The French and Spanish squadrons were moving into the outer harbour, and hopes were entertained that they would be got off in the event of a chang of the popular sentiment, in favour of the French.

The San Juste, a Spanish man of war, had ar ived at Cadiz from Vera Cruz, with 9,200,000 follars on board, for the use of the Patriots.

By the William, Captain Holman, a vessel ar rived at Liverpool, in twelve days from Lisbon, we learn that twelve sail of transports with troops on board under convoy of a frigate, had left the Tagus, for Cadiz, the day before the William sailed. The remainder of the British troops in Portugal were preparing to sail without loss of time

On Saturday, we received, a large packet of Dutch and German papers to the 29th ult. by a vessel which we understand escaped from Varel on the 2d instant. We hear there are letters in town of that date, announcing, that the hitherto port of Varel had been given by Buonaparte to the Duke
