**SATURDAY'S POST.**  
**BY EXPRESS.**  
LONDON, APRIL 14.  
**TWO** Cottonburgh Mills arrived yesterday, with  
letters and papers to the fit inf. Hostilities  
have ceased between the Russians and the Swedes,  
and a negotiation for peace has commenced.  
It is reported that the settling the terms  
is referred to consult the will and pleasure  
of France. Our hope of a continuance of friend-  
ship between Sweden and England, must, of course,  
be very light. The King of Sweden has been  
removed from Dromingholm to the Castle of  
Holsa. No reason is assigned for this change.—  
Peace and tranquillity prevailed in Sweden.  
It is with great pleasure that we acquaint our  
readers that the *Junon* French frigate, of 48 guns;  
and 306 men, has been captured near the Saints,  
by the *Horatio* and *Lafayette* frigates. The Captain  
of the *Junon* is killed, and the first 180 men killed  
in the action; the rest was laden with  
coffee and sugar, from Guadaloupe. Captain Scott,  
and his first Lieutenant, were are  
forry to add, are wounded.  
Dispatches were yesterday received at the  
Admiralty from Sir J. D. Boscawen, dated the 26th  
ult. In consequence of the intelligence  
which had reached Admiral Duckworth,  
of the blockade of the Red Sea in Bahque Roads,  
he was preparing to return to England. Four  
ships of his squadron had been ordered to proceed  
to Cadix.  
Dispatches were also received yesterday evening  
from Lord Gambier, which confirm the  
accounts of the capture of the enemy's fleet from  
Bahque Roads into Rochfort Harbour.  
Sir Arthur Wellesley and his staff remained  
yesterday, at Pointe-aux-Canons, which had fallen  
under the convoy of the *Friedrichstein*, for Lisbon,  
had put yesterday into Stoke's Bay, being forced  
back by contrary winds.  
It is stated in letters received yesterday from  
Plymouth, that the *Diana* was on board of  
which Admiral Boscawen was proceeding to take  
command in the Brazils had been captured after  
a severe action, by three French frigates.—  
No such account has yet been received at the  
Admiralty.  
A Meeting of the Inhabitants of the Borough  
of Southwark was held yesterday, which a series  
of Resolutions were presented by Mr. Warren  
and his principal political supporters, and  
strongly recommending a Parliamentary Reform.

Yesterday, a Ballot was held at the East India  
House for the election of six Directors.—At six  
o'clock the numbers were finally closed.—Sir

Robert Williams, Esq. 1160; G. W. Thelloull,  
Esq. 766. Whereupon the six Gentlemen were  
declared duly elected to serve the term of four  
years.

The fleet from Portugal, consisting of thirty sail,  
under convoy of the *Lacina* frigate, is arrived.  
**HOUSE OF COMMONS, Thursday, April 13.**—The  
House went into a Committee on the Local Militia  
Bill. Lord Galloway moved, that many coun-  
ties had not been able to complete their number,  
he would propose that the old bounty should be con-  
tinued till the first of January next, and that the 10th  
of May, as before intended.—This was agreed to.  
Upon a point of training, in some cases, beyond  
the limits of the county, an Amendment was intro-  
duced, stating distinctly that men were not to be  
removed to the adjacent county, unless it was  
to the Lord Lieutenant, stating that this would be  
more convenient for themselves.

divided into four Divisions, consisting of the several  
Hundreds herein after mentioned; each of which Di-  
visions shall provide a Battalion of Local Militia within  
the time to be called, maintained, trained, and exercised  
within such Division only.

The quota of each Battalion will be raised in  
each Division, by the number of those who are be-  
tween the ages of 18 and 30; and which will, in  
fact, amount (according to the Returns last before  
the Meeting) to fill three-fourths of the persons liable to  
serve in each Battalion.

The prevent, if possible, the necessity of any  
Ballot, it would be extremely desirable that the several  
Yeomanry and Volunteer Corps should transfer their  
services to the Battalion of the County of Oxford, and  
be considered, as an inducement to them to do so,  
to do, they are to consider that, under their present  
circumstances, should his Majesty at any time think fit  
to dispense with the Militia, they will be obliged to  
depend on the Militia; and if they will be under the  
necessity of entering into the Local Militia, or remain  
liable to serve by Ballot in the above mentioned pro-  
portion, and without the advantage of permission to  
serve by Ballot.

Should any or the whole of the Yeomanry and  
Volunteer Corps be induced, under the above con-  
siderations, to present to transfer their services to the  
Battalion of the County of Oxford, it is to be desired  
that the persons who have taken the oaths (which their laudable exertions  
hitherto have substantially given them much they have  
had at heart), but they will also relieve their friends  
and neighbours from the anxiety of being obliged to  
attend a Ballot, and to be considered, in a private point of  
view, that in the Local Establishment they will individually  
enjoy the same and many more advantages.

Should the whole of a Corps of Officers man-  
dantly their services to the County of Oxford, they  
should, and continue to command them; and  
during the 28 days' training and exercise, required  
every year by Act of Parliament, and they are to be  
considered as being in the Militia, and to be  
discharged. Whether this transfer should take place as a  
whole Corps, or only as individuals, each person will  
be entitled, in the first place, to Two Guineas, by way  
of gratuity, and in the second place, to be considered  
in point of pay and clothing (during the 28 days of  
exercise), like a soldier in the regular army; and  
in addition to which, each person under these  
circumstances, shall be considered as being in the  
County of Oxford Militia, for the term of six years, and a  
further allowance yearly for necessaries during the  
service.

It should not be omitted, that by the Act, the ab-  
sence of persons from home for the purpose of training  
and exercise is to occasion no alteration in the engage-  
ments between masters and servants, or to be con-  
sidered a willful absence.  
Should any of the Officers wish to be considered as  
individuals offering their voluntary services for any  
particular, although not engaged in any Volunteer  
Corps, and is proposed that such voluntary offers,  
together with the Yeomanry and Volunteer Corps,  
should be transferred their services in each Division, may  
prevent the necessity of any Ballot whatsoever.
