A cutter from Holland flates, that a flort time fince upwards of 400 armed Prulinus fuddenly entered the kingdom of Wediphalia, and foired the money belonging to the Crown. They did not commit the least violation of private property. After remaining 48 hours they retired, having previoudly circulated a variety of inflammatory proclamations, inciting the inhabitants to rife and flake off the yoke of France. This event, which is probably nothing more than the refult of great milety acting upon men of military habits, has been taken up very ferioudly by King Jerome. He has feat a courier to Koningberg, with orders to his Minister to deimand an explanation, and to declare that if fulficient farisfaction to not made for the outrage, it shall be considered as a declaration of war.
