Mr. Pewpr rose; He said upon the former debates upon the war in India, he had not attended the House, but having heard a conduct had been imputed to the Noble Lord at the head of our affairs in India, diametrically opposite to his known character;—hearing that a person of his Lordship's plainness and sacerity in all his transactions had been charged with having been forward in the promotion of plans sounded in fraud, in duplicity, and in crooked policy, he acknowledged that he was anxious to hear the arguments in support of those charges.—He had carefully examined the papers on the table, and had attentively listened to the House, to explain all those wonders and mysteries; but after all the attention he had been enabled to give, the conclusions he drew were directly contrary to those of the House Gentleman.

That the conduct of Tippoo had been, from his accession to the Mysore Government, marked with a sooted hatred to the Britsh and that for the last four years, his conduct had been evidently hostile: he wished Gentlemen to recollect the Embally to France, where, as was generally known, a treaty had been agitated for the extipation of the British from India. He concluded by faying, he trusted and believed, from respectable authority, that Seringapatam had really been in the possession of the British arms for two mouths.

Coloud Phipps, in a very able speech, condemned the resolutions. He compared the character of Tippoo, and that of the British Government, in the business of the war, with those of a wolf and a lamb, and, by the aid of his professional knowledge, thew great light on our military operations in India.
