With a view to preant, if possible, similar accidents from occurring in future, permit me, Sir, through the medium of your widely circulating Paper, to recommend, that in all Tallow, Varnish, and other Melting-houses or Laberatories, where the above-mentioned substances or laquids are fabricated or prepared, that a quantity of Dry Sand or Earth be kept in reserve, to be used in case of accident by fire: by throwing this on the surface of such substances or liquids, that may, during the process of preparation, take fire, the flame may certainly soon be got under. Where it is practicable, I would propose that a lid or cover of shection be kept for the purpose of damping under such circumstances. The means here brought forward are attended with so little expense, that I hope they will be resorted to. Any one can make trial of the above on a small plan, which will never be found to fall, if care be taken that the Sand or Earth be perfectly dry.
