SUMMARY OF POLITICS.

Paris Papers have been received to the 3d inst by which, though they are silent respecting the Grand Army in the North, it plainly appears that the late disasters in Russia have had no other effect on the French people, than to increase their exer tions for prosecuting the war, both in the North and the South; and they treat with great contempt the language of our Treasury Journals upon that subject, as well as the mission of Lord WALPOLE to Vienna, for the purpose of seducing the Emperor of Austria from his alliance with France.

With respect to BUONAPARTE himself, the Paris papers represent him as not only visiting the theatre and other public places, and partaking of the pleasures of the chace, but as receiving the Ad-dresses of public bodies and public functionaries as if he were considered as having done nothing out for the good and honour of the country ove which he has been called to preside. We mention this to shew the futility of our Ministers' views, if they calculate upon his speedy destruction, to make way for the illusive success which they prognosticate from their own measures. We trust that in future, after so many vain predictions about the fate of the great and hated foe, the rulers of sur country will repose upon more solid foundations for securing our own prosperity, viz. the removin those abuses in the Government which have brought

us to the very verge of ruin.

The Lisbon and Corunna Mails, which arrived on Thursday, contain no intelligence of any importance. The English and French Armics are gone into winter quarters.

The maritime successes of the Americans seem at last to have roused Ministers from their torpor as they are now about to commence measures, which should have been carried into execution some months ago.

The determination of Ministers to resist the East

India monopoly has considerably alarmed the Pro-prietors of that stock. It is certainly a question of great importance, and may involve many conside-rations, of which we are not perhaps at present aware; but considering it as the cause of a free trade against a monopoly, we cannot help wishing success to the former; for on the first view of the business, it appears to us that a Government has no more right to sell the seeds of future prosperity of the country to a class of speculators for everthan a man has to grant a lease of an entailed estate in perpetuity; and that the possessions of the Company in the East, cannot, in point of fact, be considered as freehold, but only as leasehold property, to be held by them, from time to time under certain conditions, as Parliament may think proper to renue their charter.
