

FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.

THE Christian Papers to the 7th last were received on Wednesday. The following is an extract from a Paper of the 6th—

INTERESTING FROM WASHINGTON.—We are indebted to our friends at Washington for the following political news. The views which they furnish of the late Treaty with Spain are interesting to all classes of readers. We rejoice at the success of the Florida. The advantages are great and interesting. The influence and command which it gives us over the Indian trade and the navigation of such a long line of coast, and the ports which it embraces; the entire command of all the rivers which flow from our own territory into the Gulf through all its extent; the stop which we put to smuggling; to the Slave Trade; to foreign emissaries; the land which it secures, with the valuable oak it produces, these advantages are almost incalculable. From the St. Lawrence to the Gulf of Mexico is ours! Besides the embarrassments from which it relieves us in our relations with Spain, on account of the unpopularity of the Indian trade, the head-hunting which it heats even with the power, and the finer foundations on which our peace, repose, and life as settles the foreign question which arises from General Jackson's proceedings—thus removes the embarrassments which were used, with so much effect to arrest an inquiry into General Jackson's course, we may now look at the domestic view of the question with greater freedom. Spain is quieted; but is the Constitution satisfied? Shall the predominance of the military over the civil power be still calmly admitted to?

PARIS PAPERS.

The Paris Papers of Sunday and Monday, which arrived on Thursday morning, notice a rumour which prevailed in that city respecting a remarkable occurrence which was said to have taken place in Berlin on the 2d or 3d of this month. The rumour rests, as it appears, solely on the authority of a letter inserted in the Gazette of Augsburg, of the 12th, and is stated in the following words in the Journal des Debats.

"The rumour which has been circulated respecting an attempt at violence against the person of the King of Prussia, appear to have had some foundation. A letter inserted in the Gazette of Augsburg of the 12th of April, says, that early in April, a crowd of persons, about 1,500 in number, surrounded the King's carriage as his Majesty was airing in the Park, and presented in him petitions, signed by each person, all having for their object to demand a Constitution. His Majesty passed a great number of these petitions, but seeing that there was end of them, the King wished to proceed on his way. The petitioners threw themselves before the horses of the carriage. The King then sent an order to a neighbouring post of the Landwehr to disperse this crowd, which was done without difficulty, the petitioners retiring peacefully, and protesting that they entertained no bad intentions. The circumstances of this event are varied, some making it to have taken place on the 2d of April, others on the 3d, others affirming that the Landwehr ordered some limitation, so that the petitioners threatened to appear again, to the number of 30,000 men. The Gazette of Augsburg finally considers the whole account as unpropitious, or at least as very much exaggerated."

In this latter supposition we are inclined to concur; for accounts from Berlin, not only by the public papers, but in private letters of dates even to the 10th of this month, are utterly silent respecting this occurrence; and it is quite impossible to believe that so remarkable an event had occurred, would not have found its way into some of the Journals of Germany. The Prussians who are now in Paris, without any reason, contradict the rumour.

The following are further extracts from the Paris Papers:—

At half-past one o'clock the Persian Ambassador attended an audience of his Majesty. His Excellency took leave of the King, as also of Monsieur, Madame, and the other members of the Royal Family.

The proprietors of the daily papers of Paris have joined in presenting to the two Chambers some observations on the three projects of laws relative to the Liberty of the Press. They require, among other matters, that the penalties prescribed against injurious language should not exceed in their maximum the minimum of penalties denounced against defamation—that they should not be compelled to name two proprietors for one paper—and that the amount proposed for the security should be reduced.

We learn from Germany that the Physicians who have undertaken the care of M. de Kotzebue's bedside, were desirous of making an incision in the side of the chest, to bring on a suppuration, which they did not promote a cure, might at least prolong the life of their patient. Sandt, however, violently opposed this operation. The German Papers say whether he might not with justice be constrained to submit to it?

LONDON.

The Prince Regent has purchased the Palace at Newmarket, which is to undergo a complete renovation under the direction of Mr. Nash. The occasional residence of his Royal Highness there would no doubt, infuse new life into the town and its surroundings.

The troops quartered in Scotland are soon to change their quarters. The 1st or Royal Dragoons, and the 5th or Buffs, are to be replaced by the 7th Hussars (the Marquis of Anglesea Colonel), and the 10th Hussars (the Prince Regent Colonel). The 88th, at present in the Castle, are to be relieved by the 50th, now at Hills. The 8th foot, at present at Tyromouth, &c. march to Glasgow; and the 40th now quartered in that city, go to Tyromouth.

ROYAL FREEMASONS' CHARITY FOR FEMALE CHILDREN.

Wednesday evening the Anniversary Festival of this excellent Institution, was celebrated at the Freemasons' Tavern, Great Green-street, Lincoln's-Inn-fields; his Royal Highness the Duke of Sussex in the Chair, supported by Lord Howe, Lord Pomfret, John George Lambton, Esq. About six o'clock 300 persons sat down to an excellent dinner, and a military band, which was stationed in the music-gallery, played several airs and tunes during the evening.

Friday being the celebration of the Prince Regent's birth day, as commanded some time since, at one o'clock the Park and Tower guns were fired in honour of the occasion.

EARLY DEPRIVATION.

A boy about eight years of age, named Swarman, was indicted for having stolen a waistcoat which hung upon a line to dry.

The Prisoner was seen in the Prosecutor's yard, but how he got there nobody could guess; for the wall was high, and there was no entrance to the yard except through the house which was fastened. Under his PIN A POKE he pinned the waistcoat which he had taken off the line. On being questioned, he seemed to be in a great deal of distress, committed any offence, and told a dismal story of the death of his mother; one word of which was not true. The officer who had been employed upon this occasion said, the boy's mother had declared before the Magistrate, when he was six years of age, that she had endeavoured to check her child's propensity to theft; that the love of plunder had grown up with him; and nothing but violent measures could restrain him, for he avoided the sight of every body who wished to do him a service. The child's conduct, he said, had cost the waistcoat, and supported himself by thieving. He mentioned to the officer that he and a man named Williams were in league; that they were in the habit of going out every evening together to see what they could steal from the wash-tubs, and that their best days were Fridays, because the washwomen were on those days very busy in getting up their linen. He also stated that he lived with Williams, who took him to the Prosecutor's premises, and sent him out to a part of his account.

The Prisoner was found guilty, and sentenced to three months imprisonment.

A STOCKING EVENT occurred recently in one of the journals of that place—"Two individuals, animated each against the other by an inveterate hatred, repaired to the boulevard St. Hilaire, near the barrier de Montcalm. They were, he said, without weapons, and they had found any. Their swords are crossed—both are already wounded—one of them wishes to stop the combat—the other refuses—the swords are again crossed.
