In "Becket," the turbulence of the twelfth century is reproduced with wonderful exacti-tude. The "eternal triangle" is never absent from the stirring drama, and the reconstruction of the period together with the scenes at Canterbury give "Becket" an authenticity that stamps it as one of the greatest historical episodes ever filmed.
