OUR LONDON LETTER. Easy Terms at Bargain Prices.

London. Looming large in the list of coming events which attract special interest in London is the wedding of the Duke of York. This is growing daily, as may be judged from the simple fact that the precincts of Westminster are alive with the activities of workmen busied on the task of erecting stands for spectators. The prices to be charged for the privilege vary from two to five guineas per seat at present, and it is quite on the cards that these will appreciate substantially before the day of the ceremony. Within the Abbey more modified preparations are in progress. Among them, certainly a somewhat severely regal type of chair quite evidently intended to play a prominent part in the ceremonial. Hard by, in the neighbourhood of Abbot Islip's Chapel, with show of Royal splendour, is destined for the convenience of the privileged few who, while belonging to the Royal circle, will not take any part in the proceedings beyond those of lookers-on. Of the setting nothing now can be said. The carpet, perhaps, the most noticeable feature of the scene, and the other architectural features adds to the beauty and dignity of the scene. Than this there could be nothing more suitable to what in itself will be a picturesque event. The Duke of York has become a popular figure in public life during the past few years. ROADS AND TRAFFIC.

Living as we do in days of motor-traffic, interpreted, means fast and heavy traffic destructive to roads, and an alarming extent-the ratpayers, especially those living in country districts, are brought face to face with heavy demands arising out of this condition of affairs. So greatly, indeed, has the burden increased of late years, that it has in many cases become well-nigh unbearable. During the past ten years the cost of the upkeep of country roads has increased nearly four-fold, and in this connection it is of the utmost importance to be aware of the fact that there are two authorities who are responsible for the upkeep of roads-the County and District Councils-there are certain classifications of responsibility which are laid down in the Statute. This can best be understood by a brief statement. The Ministry of Transport allows a grant to the County Councils on the basis of the number of motor-cars on the roads, and a smaller grant on that of the second class. So far, so good.
