

DOUBLE WEDDING SCENES.

CROWDS HOLD UP HIGHGATE TRAFFIC.

Marriages of Mr. N. Sargant's Son and Daughter.

Bride from Czecho-Slovakia.

One of the most fashionable double weddings that have been solemnised in Islington for some considerable time, took place at Archway Road Wesleyan Church, on Saturday, when Miss Nell Sargant, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Sargant, of "Roden," Horsney Lane, was married to Dr. John Douglas Proctor, M.P. (P.), of Longton, Staffs.; and her eldest brother, Mr. Thomas Sargant, was married to Miss Marie Alouskova, of Boskovic, Czecho-Slovakia.

People returning from their places of business in the West End were attracted by the red carpet which covered the steps of the church, and so large did the throng of onlookers become that the police had some difficulty in keeping them clear of traffic.

Inside the church itself was a large and representative gathering. Mr. Norman Sargant will be remembered as the Liberal candidate for North Islington at general election. He has also been connected with the Wesleyan Church in general, and particularly with the Archway Wesleyan Church, whilst his daughter, Nell, has been prominent member of the Sisterhood, members of which were assigned a special place in the church during the ceremony.

Colleagues of Dr. Proctor, who is engaged in research work at University College Hospital, were also much in evidence.

WELL-KNOWN ATHLETE.

Mr. Thomas Sargant is a notable figure in the world of sport, having gained many successes on the running track. He is a member of the Stamford Bridge Athletic Club, and has won trophies for mile and half-mile events. He also has been connected with the Archway Church, through his association with the Sunday School and Boys' Brigade.

The wedding of their son and daughter was also the thirtieth anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. Sargant's wedding, making the occasion all the more notable. Miss Nell Sargant looked charming in the brilliant sunshine, as she walked down the red carpeted steps in her bridal gown of ivory moire. She wore a veil of real lace and a halo of orange blossom. She was given away by her father.

The crowd surged forward to catch a glimpse of Miss Alouskova, who wore a charming creation of ivory satin, with a head-dress of orange blossom, from which a lace veil hung. The Rev. T. H. Barrett gave her away.

Both brides carried bouquets of lilies, and were attended by the Misses Rachel and Esther Sargant, Miss Isabel Proctor (sister of Dr. Proctor), Miss Cecilia Smart and Miss Francis Barrett. The bridesmaids were attired in frocks of sea-green tulle silk, with crinoline hats to match, and carried sheaves of gladioli.

CHORAL SERVICE.

Mrs. Norman Sargant wore a gown of beige georgette, with golden lace trimming and hat to match, while Mrs. Proctor was a striking figure in fur-trimmed fawn georgette. Both carried bouquets of tea roses.

The Rev. C. Eusor Walters (secretary of the London Mission) and Miss Nell and Mr. Sargant performed the ceremony. He was assisted by the Rev. A. N. Rose, a former minister of Archway Road Wesleyan Church.

An address was given by the Rev. T. H. Barrett, M.A. (Governor of Didsbury College), Mr. Arthur Meale, the renowned organist of Westminster Central Hall, was the organist, and solos were rendered by Mr. Madoc Davies during the signing of the register.

Mr. Jack Tatton, an old college friend, acted as best man for Dr. Proctor, while Mr. Thomas Sargant was attended by his brother, Mr. W. W. Sargant.

The reception was held at "Roden," Horsney Lane, three hundred guests attending. Many of them came from as far afield as Staffordshire for the occasion.

Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Sargant are spending their honeymoon touring Devon, whilst Dr. and Mrs. Proctor are spending theirs in Italy.

MIDNIGHT CAR CRASH.

Tufnell Park Man's Tragic Death.

Sequel to a Christening Party.

A sad story of a motoring mishap was told at the St. Pancras Coroner's Court, on Wednesday, when Sir Walter Schroder held an inquest on the body of Arthur John Yeo, aged 26, of 42, Dalmeny Road, Islington, who was killed on Monday, when the car in which he was returning from a christening party with some friends, ran into some railings.

Mrs. Eleanor Yeo, the widow, broke down when giving evidence of identification.

Fanny Louisa Yeo, deceased's mother, said she last saw her son alive on Sunday evening. She met him at a friend's house at Paddington, at about 4 p.m. There was a christening party. She remained there all the evening and left about 11 o'clock in a car driven by Mr. Norris, who took her home and left Holland Park. When she left Holland Park her son was still there and was quite well and sober.

William Frederick Green, of Holland Park Mews, Paddington, stated that deceased visited him at his house on Sunday last and left about midnight in a car.

Witness left the house in another car. The car driven by Mr. Norris was following.

When they reached Regent's Park witness was under the impression that the second car was some little distance behind him. He slowed down with the intention of waiting for it near North Gate.

"I heard a crash which appeared to come from the back of me," added witness. When I looked I found that the other car had gone into the railings and Yeo was lying on the ground in front of the car. He was unconscious.

KNOCKED DOWN RAILINGS.

Leslie Arthur Green, an assistant shop-keeper, of 4, Camden Road, a passenger in the car which contained Yeo, said the deceased man was sitting in the middle of the back seat. They were travelling at about 20 to 25 miles per hour when the smash occurred.

Witness, who had been speaking to the occupants in the back seat of the car, heard a shout and turned round. The car was then nearly on the footway. They ran into the railings, knocked them down and came to a standstill on the other side of the railings. He saw Cagney and Pritchard, but did not see Yeo until sometime afterwards. He was about four yards in front of the car and was lying on his back.

Dr. Rosilyn Ernst, of the London Temperance Hospital, said that Yeo was dead when brought into the hospital. Death was instantaneous and was due to a lacerated brain and fractured skull.

P. S. Walter Edge said when he arrived at the scene of the accident "Norris made the following statement:—"I was driving along the outer circle following another car from Hanover Gate going towards Camden Town. I saw a light and thought it was a lamp standard. I went to pass it so as to leave it on my off-side. I then realised I was wrong, but I was too late and ran into the railings."

The coroner adjourned the inquest until Wednesday, September 25, so that Harold Pritchard, another passenger in the car, who is still suffering from injuries, might give evidence.

SUNDAY TRADING.

Chamber of Commerce and Legislation Proposal.

In view of the increase of Sunday trading in recent years, and of the probability of the opinion of some of the experts qualified to judge, a rapid extension of it in the near future, an influential supported movement has been started to promote legislation to restrict Sunday trading to limited hours and to necessary articles.

The Islington Chamber of Commerce has been approached on the matter and the executive committee takes the view that on such an important matter every member should have an opportunity of expressing an opinion.

Consequently, each member has received a ballot card, on which he will be able to state whether or not he is in favour of the enactment of legislation restricting Sunday trading to limited hours and to necessary articles.

The result of the ballot will be made known at Tuesday's luncheon-meeting of the Chamber, when a resolution will probably be passed on the matter.

At the same meeting, the Chamber will welcome Mr. R. H. Jerman, the new Town Clerk of Islington, who will deliver an address on "The Municipal Service of Islington."

Mr. Jerman was formerly Town Clerk of Salisbury.

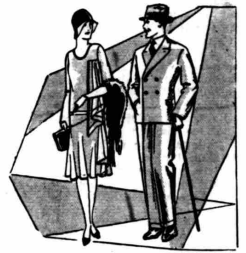
