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**FATHER'S CONCERN.**  
CHILD THAT DIED IN L.C.C. NURSING HOME.

On Friday, at Brixton, Mr. Sewell, deputy coroner, held an inquest on the body of Peter Allatt, aged 12 days, the son of a motor mechanic, living at Wyke-garden, Brixton.  
John Allatt, the father, said that the child was born at the L.C.C. Nursing Home, and it appeared to get on all right until it went under an operation for circumcision.  
On the evening of the operation he saw deceased, who did not appear to be all right. He spoke to a nurse, who said the child was getting on all right.  
The following day he telephoned to the institution, asking after deceased, and in reply a nurse said, "What are you getting the wind up for?" The child died next Sunday.  
Dorothy Newberry, matron at the Home, stated that Mrs. Allatt was admitted on Tuesday, January 30, and was confined the same evening. On Thursday, February 8, the child was circumcised, and did not appear to thrive afterwards.  
The operation was performed by a medical man who attended the Home daily. Everything possible was done for deceased, but it expired as above stated.  
Dr. W. G. Johnson, divisional surgeon, who made a post-mortem examination, stated that deceased had a cyst on the right kidney, and could not possibly have lived.  
Death was due to syncope from pneumonia, possibly accelerated by toxæmia. Deceased was quite naturalled the day before. The jury returned a verdict accordingly.
