## NOTES.

The "booblers" are again exercising their lungs, after the repose of one winter.

It is expected that the new minister of Lenzie U.F. Church will be inducted to his new charge on 1st June.

Kirkintilloch Fire Brigade was roused several districts last week testing the water pressure. The unusual slight evoked considerable interest, and we understand the result was not altogether satisfactory.

Half a hundred police cases are dealt with in one issue to-day, more than half of them being cyclists who preferred the footpath to the king's highway.

The vacancy in the representation of the Second Ward at the Parish Council remains a vacancy. Mr. Robt. Hudson has declined election.

Dumbarshire Education Authority has decided to spend the sum of £11,000 (inclusive of the cost of conveyance of pupils) during the next financial year on their bursary scheme.

There was plenty of May dew to meet the needs of all beauty seekers yesterday morning. There will be rent due in a fortnight, but the wretchedness will not be quite so abundant.

The quality of generosity in Kirkintilloch is not strained. A week ago St. Ninian's School got £140 out of the pockets of the public, while on Saturday Laidlaw School extracted £130.

Mr. Tom Johnston, M.P., has prepared us for a "shock" when the report of the Public Accounts Committee is published. It is not an easy thing to shock the British taxpayer now.

Dumbarshire school janitors prefer the present system of monthly payment to that of weekly payment. A weekly payment would "roll wages," while the monthly draft reads "salary."

Carnegie Glen had a holiday look about it on Sabbath afternoon, hundreds of those who gathered for the unveiling of the memorial at Lennoxton protracing their stay by a visit to the Glen. Church attendance in Kirkintilloch in the evening suffered accordingly.

Cumbernauld School Management Committee have been exercising over the question of whether members, on visiting schools, were entitled to read what was written in the log book before affixing their signatures. Their doubts have been set at rest by official intimation that they can indulge their curiosity if they so desire.

Permanent work for clerks, cooks, butchers, shoemakers, tailors, fitters, electricians, blacksmiths and many other trades, at pay from 24/6 per week, rising to £8 6/- per week, plus food, clothes, housing, and a month's holiday each year (full pay), is being offered by the Royal Air Force, and, in these days of unemployment, we should not wonder if headquarters are inundated with applications.

The proprietors of St. Ninian's R.C. School put down the capital value of that school at £13,048, while the Education Authority's valuation may be £2000. The independent auditor has gone the length of £667. The rental value was put by the first parties at £715, and by the second at £310. The independent man has set it down at £386.

"Hallo! Exchange. Should we arrange a picnic for to-morrow?" This is the kind of question that may be added to the list asked the telephone exchange girls during the summer. Commencing yesterday, any subscriber ringing up the local exchange after 5 p.m. and obtain the weather forecast for the following day. Wrong forecasts, however, should not be treated as "complaints," as the weather-clerk is not a telephone official.

In not a few homes last week there was negligence in the way of advancing the domestic fire-keeper, but we heard of at least one house into which Summer-time came with a vengeance. The father pushed forward the hands before going to bed, and a son who came in after the old man was asleep slipped it forward another hour. Then the mother did in the morning was to advance the clock, so that the family had Summer-time at least two hours before any other body. They are hoping to get the lost hours back in September.

## LOCAL NEWS.

We understand that Rev. Geo. Aitken, South U.F. Church, has been called away to Italy, where his brother is lying seriously ill. This is his second visit within the past month.

**PARISH COUNCIL VACANCY.**—We learn that Mr. Robt. Hudson has declined co-optation to the Parish Council, as a representative of the Second Ward, in succession to Dr. And. Cowan, resigned.

There was a big burst in the water main in Wilson Road, near Birdston Farm, on Sabbath evening. Workmen were soon on the job, and made the necessary repairs in the course of the night.

Communion services were held in the Presbyterian Churches on Sabbath last. Preparatory services were held on Friday, and in one or two cases thanksgiving services were held on Monday night.

A SEMI-JUBILEE.—On the occasion of having celebrated his semi-jubilee as minister at Aberdeen, Aberdeenshire, and also in the circumstances that he has been clerk of Turf Trustees during the past 15 years, the Rev. A. A. Duncan, F.D., Ancherles, was entertained at dinner by his co-pastors, and presented with a portable typewriter. Mr. Duncan was recalled to Kirkintilloch Parish Church before going to Aberdeenshire.

The quarterly meeting of the Co-operative Society is being held to-morrow night.

At a meeting of the "King David" Lodge of Shepherds on Monday night, Mr. Robt. Davie was appointed secretary, and Mr. Alex. Richmond treasurer.

**MINERS' HALL.**—The Kirkintilloch and Twechar Miners' Union are negotiating for a site at Woodhead for the hall they are about to erect, under the welfare scheme. The site is one facing Industry Street, with an entrance behind the Dalrymple Fountain there.

**FLAG DAY.**—In Kirkintilloch the flag day for the Royal Infirmary was under the superintendence of Miss F. Fletcher, Forthbank, Mrs. Morrison, The Manse; and Mrs. Henderson, Oxford Cottage. In addition to a numerous staff of collectors, Mr. James M'Callum, his wife, and his four sons did great work all over the district. The amount collected in Kirkintilloch totalled £40 11/11.

**GOSPEL TEMPERANCE UNION.**—The fellowship meeting in the Temperance Hall on Thursday last was addressed by Mr. James M'Vears, Glasgow. **LABOUR EXCHANGE FRAUD.**—Peter Bryne, 13 Langmuir Street, Kirkintilloch, pleading guilty in Dumbar Sheriff Court last week to defrauding the Labour Exchange of five days' "dole," amounting to 12/6, was fined £4 or ten days. Accused falsely declared on the register at the Exchange that he was unemployed on dates when he was working for wages at work providing.

**A BIG CONTRACT.**—Alexanders Stores, Limited, through their Glasgow branch, have been successful in securing a large contract for the supply of all the agricultural and farm tools, also ropes and twines for Glasgow Parish Council for the next six months. The institutions to be supplied include Woodilee Asylum, Stobhill Hospital, Barnhill Poorhouse, Duke Street Hospital, and Oakbank Hospital.

Our obituary column to-day contains notice of the death, at the residence of a motor accident, of a Kirkintilloch woman and her daughter, 9 years of age. The woman is Mrs. F. Harrison, who, before her married days, was Miss Jean Anderson Graham, a daughter of the late Mr. Colin Graham, joiner, Odessa Cottage. She was for some time in her father's shop at the top of Freeland Street, and after her mother's death, kept her in her father's shop. She emigrated to Canada fourteen years ago, with her husband, and at a later date she was resident at Los Angeles, California. The accident, which involved her death and that of her daughter, took place on 1st April.
