College for Working Women Annual Festival

The annual summer festival of the College for Working Women, Fitzroy-street, Fitzroy-square, took place last week under most gratifying auspices, the chair being taken by Mr. A. F. Birch-Reynardson, who made a most genial president over the proceedings, in the regretted absence through illness of Mr. F. Morris, President of the College Council.

The first item on the programme was the college report read by Mrs. Plant, the hon. secretary of the college, who made a highly picturesque figure in a dainty toilette of deep cream. Mrs. Plant dealt at length with the increased activities of the college during the year, and emphasised the need for renewed energies in facing the forthcoming restoration expenses needed towards the building, and involving a considerable outlay for the college authorities.

The prizes were distributed by Dame Millicent Fawcett, D.B.E., who gave the students a vivid account of her recent visit to Paris to attend the International Women's Congress. Several of the books had been kindly presented by the teachers, including Miss Birch-Reynardson, whose interest in the college never flags; Miss Hall, the talented elocution teacher; Miss Dixon, who so successfully runs the needlework class; Miss Plumb, who is equally happy in her shorthand class; and Mr. Andersson, the German teacher, and Mr. Andersson.

Following the prize distribution came a lively speech from Miss Hannah Cohen, who is always to the front in college functions, and has always interesting things to say in an interesting fashion.

Refreshments were served to the guests, the evening concluding by a distribution of beautiful bouquets of flowers to the students, one and all—a time-honoured custom of the college. Juniors Choirs, not exceeding 20 singers.—The "Charles Clements" Cup won by Buckland Congregational Band of Hope (Plymouth), conductor, Mr. A. Y. Johnston; second, Penarth Orpheus Juvenile, conducted by Miss A. Field.

Ditto, not exceeding 40 singers.—The "Frederic Smith" Shield won by Lake-road Band of Hope (Plymouth), conductor, Mr. W. T. Sayer; second, Penarth Juvenile Temperance Choir, conducted by Mrs. L. R. England; third, Loughborough Park, conductor Mr. A. Reeves.

Senior Mixed Voice Choirs, not exceeding 30 singers.—The "W. E. Green" Vase won by Eastleigh Baptist Church Choir, conductor, Mr. W. G. Hedges; second, Walthamstow Temperance Choral Society, conductor, Mr. E. Parish.

Ditto, not exceeding 50 singers.—The "Charles Clements" Shield won by Reading Temperance Choral Society, conductor, Mr. F. W. Drew; second, Bournemouth Wesleyan Central Hall, conductor, Mr. S. W. Sharvell.

The adjudicator was Mr. E. S. Roper, B.A., Mus.B., F.R.C.O.

Burglary Charge at Mornington Crescent
